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Tribute

"It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes up short again and again, ... who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly." Excerpted from *Citizenship In A Republic*, a speech by Theodore Roosevelt delivered at the Sorbonne in Paris, France, on April 23, 1910.

Self government depends upon the willingness of citizens to *serve*, in the arena, as Roosevelt so eloquently stated. We honor the following citizens whose services we lost in 2017.

Malcolm MacDonald spent his retirement years in Surry, serving on the Planning Board from 1995-2004, many as chair, during a period of heightened activity updating our master plan and many of our ordinances and regulations. He used his background as an electrical engineer to study the updating of Surry's streetlights, and served as chair of the Conservation Commission from 2004-2005 to unwind from his planning board tenure. We very much appreciate his service and the legacy of plans, ordinances and regulations that guide us into the future.

Harold Pike served as a library trustee from 1987 until his death in 2017, while serving for four years on the Recreation Committee and five on the Conservation Commission. A retired elementary school teacher, we wish to thank his wife Peg for his faithful service to Surry.

Since the 1922 town history, 34 people have served Surry as one of three selectmen, sometimes known as town fathers. Roger Bienvenu was a member of that very exclusive club, having served a term in the 1980's. Roger was a very intelligent man who added a valuable perspective to the town issues in which he participated. We thank his family for the extensive contribution he made to Surry as selectman, fireman, surveyor of timber and citizen.

At last town meeting, Virginia Clark stepped down as town treasurer after serving since 1966 when Lyndon Johnson was president. Nixon, Ford, Carter, Reagan, Bush, Clinton, Bush, Obama and now Trump have all served as president during Virginia's time as treasurer. Who can blame her for deciding to step aside, and how can we ever thank her for her years of service.

Message from Selectmen

Appearances may indicate that 2017 was a quiet year. Quiet is good, especially if the alternative is a damaging flood or expensive legal issue, both of which we have had in the past. Appearances can be very deceiving, though.

2017 was an assessment review year. The review's current use portion proceeded flawlessly. Last year's reviewer was stricter in interpretation than our previous reviewer which produced disappointing results in the veterans' review portion. Based on the few who asked for explanations, the revaluation component attracted little notice, which is encouraging considering the increased number of real estate sales.

In a good news-bad news situation, the Dam Road and East Surry Road were paved for our annual road improvement project. The good news is that the one-time price was very good. The bad news is that it left us in a poor position for spending the rest of the appropriation. We were able to replace many Pond Road culverts to allow time for compaction in preparation for repaving from the Old Walpole Road to about the highway garage with this year's appropriation. We also should be able to replace as needed the remaining culverts on the Pond Road to prepare for repaving the rest of the road in 2019.

Reopening the lower Pond Road remains a possibility if the affordable concept under consideration is translated to a plan and approved by the Department of Environmental Services (DES). DES, and the Army Corps of Engineers, are concerned about water quality violations if the road is not reopened, so the do-nothing option needs to be designed and costed before a vote is taken in 2019 whether to reopen the road or not. At no cost, many options were considered in 2017 and rejected for various reasons. A couple low cost suggestions have been made that will improve the road should it be reopened. Money is available to pay for reopening the road if approval is received. Considering all options, a majority of the Board continues to support reopening the road at a reasonable cost. Whether the road reopens or not, the long-standing question of who owns the abutting tract to the north has been answered.

Some have questioned in recent years when we will replace the highway truck, and how are we going to pay for a new one. This year's warrant contains an article to buy a new truck, which we hope will put those questions to rest for several years.

A rejuvenation is occurring in the fire department, and along with it challenging requests for funds. Equipment requests are answered this year by doubling the amount raised each year for replacing a fire truck and establishing a fund for replacing smaller equipment when needed in the future. A funding source has been identified that can be used starting next year to help address the department's space needs.

Late in 2017, the town clerk's office became a municipal agent so that now most vehicle registrations can be completed at the town hall without visiting the motor vehicle office in

Keene. Many residents have been asking for this convenience that has long been available in communities statewide. Undoubtedly there will be a learning curve. Collecting money both for the state and the town has caused us to look at our processes, and made some significant changes in the town clerk's budget lines.

Since 1904 as provided by law, Surry has accepted money from many people to be held in trust, with the earnings to be used for donor specific purposes, mostly care of cemetery lots. This is the issue that prompted the article on the 2015 town meeting warrant that resulted in the office of cemetery trustees. For 5 of the last 6 years, none of that money has been spent for care of cemetery lots as promised and required. Resolving issues in a small town should be easy. But as the widower of a donor stated at an October meeting, if unsuccessful, then this issue needs to be escalated. For many, many reasons, that appears likely this year.

Next year is Surry's 250th anniversary. The amount of money set aside for that celebration has been increased this year so the Recreation Committee has the resources needed for a wonderful celebration for our residents, and so we can show others what a great community this is. If you have ideas, or are willing to help, please contact one of the committee members.

Your selectmen continue working to keep the town portion of the tax rate steady, while meeting the needs of our residents. This is difficult because costs rise while our tax base and people's incomes stay the same. Setting money aside in reserve funds for future needs allows that steadiness, allows us to earn interest rather than pay interest, and allows planning time to be sure we are getting good value for our money spent. We are generally very fortunate, and thankfully so, in having few requests for public assistance and legal services.

We appreciate all those who serve on town boards and committees, answer fire department calls, and care for the town common and library. Surry is more than a place to live. It is THE place you chose to be your home and to raise your family, and we are working to protect that while meeting the demands of the 21st century in very challenging economic times.

To: The inhabitants of the town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in the state of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs are hereby notified and warned of the Annual Town Meeting will be held as follows:

Date: Articles 1-2 Tuesday March 13, 2018 2-7 pm; Articles 3-13 Thursday March 15, 2018 7:30 pm
Location: Surry Town Hall

Article 01: Election of officers.

To choose all necessary Town officers as listed on the official ballot.

Article 02: Zoning Amendment

Are you in favor of amending Article X, Board of Adjustment, Section E. Variance of the Surry Zoning Ordinance, as recommended by the Planning Board, to replace the existing language with the following?

"E. Variance. Pursuant to the current RSA, the Board of Adjustment may authorize a variance from the terms of this ordinance only where the Board finds that all of the following conditions apply:

1. The variance will not be contrary to the public interest;
2. The spirit of the ordinance is observed;
3. Substantial justice is done;
4. The values of surrounding properties are not diminished; and
5. Literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance would result in an unnecessary hardship."

The purpose of this change is for clarification by adjusting the language of the Surry Zoning Ordinance to comply with RSA 674:33.

Article 03: Hear reports.

To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees.

Article 04: Operating Budget

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$515,862 for general municipal operations. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 05: Close Town Hall Exp Trust

To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Town Hall Maintenance Fund created in 2008 for unexpected expenditures for the town hall and attached carriage shed. Said funds, \$15,319.43 with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this article. (Majority vote required).

Article 06: Create Town Building Maintenance Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish an expendable trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Town Building Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund, for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the town hall, library, fire station and highway garage, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the fund, and to name the Selectmen as agents to expend from the fund. This article is contingent upon passage of article 5. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 07: Appropriate to 250th ETF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to place into the existing 250 th Anniversary Expendable Trust Fund, for the purpose of paying for Surry's 250 th anniversary celebration in 2019. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 08: Appropriate to 250 ETF from fund balance

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$461 to be placed into the existing 250th Anniversary Expendable Trust Fund, for the purpose of paying for Surry's 250th anniversary celebration in 2019, with said funds to come from unassigned fund balance The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$461 from unreserved fund balance to place into the existing 250 th Anniversary Expendable Trust Fund, for the purpose of paying for Surry's 250 th anniversary celebration in 2019. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 09: Close Police Cruiser CR

To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve fund created in 2013 for the purpose of purchasing a new police cruiser. Said funds, \$10,152.71 with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this article. (Majority vote required).

Article 10: Purchase Highway Truck

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165,000 to purchase a new highway truck with \$127,000 to come from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve fund, \$10,000 from unassigned fund balance and the remaining \$28,000 in general taxation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 11: Appropriate to Fire Truck Cap Res

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to place into the existing Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a future fire truck. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 12: Appropriate to Prop Reval CRF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to place into the existing Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund to pay for a future town wide property revaluation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 13: Establish Fire Equipment CRF

To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund per RSA 35:1 for the future purchase of fire equipment, raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000 for the fund, and name the selectmen as agents to expend from the fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 14: Any Other Business







Trustees of the Trust Funds

To the Residents of Town of Surry:

The Trustees of the Trust funds are the custodian of the town's perpetual care funds, charitable trusts, and capital reserve/expendable trust funds. Trustees of Trust Funds make the decisions regarding expenditure from these funds based on the wishes of the donor in the case of privately donated funds and release capital reserve funds and expendable trust funds to the appropriate government officials upon request. Trustees of Trust Funds make the decisions on how these funds are to be invested based on the investment policy adopted by the Trustees.

In executing our responsibilities as Trustees, we have accomplished the following in 2017:

- 1) Met with representatives of Charter Trust Company in April to review our portfolio and to move some of the investments to more conservative financial instruments as a protective measure for the principal invested
- 2) Reviewed trust investments with NH PDIP, noting that the new management company of those accounts has increased the fund's earnings considerably from last year
- 3) Conferred with the Cemetery Trustees to review what trust fund monies might be available for cemetery repair. The Cemetery Trustees have accomplished a lot of clean up in the three small cemeteries and are to be commended for their work. In 2018, we anticipate coordinating with them on funds available for grave specific trusts, as they begin their work on the main town cemetery



March 2018 Annual Report of the Surry School District Officers

The Annual Surry School District, SAU 91, Business Meeting will be on Thursday, March 15, 2017, 7:00 PM at the Surry Town Hall. Copies of the Warrant Articles and the Budget will be posted and also available on the Surry website.

This year is the tenth year for the Surry children to be enrolled in the Keene Public Schools. Parents and school officials have reported that Surry students are continuing to do well there. Currently, there are 89 Surry students attending schools in Keene. Thirteen Surry students are tuitioned privately, 3 are home schooled, and 24 attend one of the three charter schools. Thank you to all in town who have been so helpful to the Board in keeping an accurate census of Surry's children. Families planning changes wherein their children will attend school are encouraged to contact the School Board ahead of time to help facilitate a smooth transition for student and family.

Again this year, more families with preschool and school age children are moving to, or building in, Surry. During the current and previous academic years, there have been 15-30 students moving in or out of Keene enrollments. We anticipate this trend to continue as there are houses for sale, building lots available, and rental homes in Surry. The graph below illustrates the trend.



One of the Surry School Board's primary roles is to serve the educational needs of Surry children. If you have a question or concern about your child's education, development or services, we welcome you to meet with us. The School Board's other primary role is to be a careful steward of taxpayer funds. Our annual audit by Vachone Clukay (CPA) Company found the Surry School District's accounts to be in order for the year ended June 30, 2017.

Surry has joined the A.R.E.A. agreement with Marlow, Chesterfield, Westmoreland, Harrisville, Keene, Nelson and Stoddard for grades 7-12. The agreement is a twenty-year tuition commitment to the Keene School District in exchange for a 2.5% reduction on our tuition rates each year. Surry and Keene voters and the State Board of Education approved this in 2017, so the new rates go into effect for the 2018-19 academic year. Our projected savings are about \$20,000 depending on enrollment. The Board is currently in process to join the A.R.E.A. for grade 6. We hope for this to be effective for the 2019-2020 year pending voter and State Board of Education approval.

According to the building inspection done by Patrick Richardson a few of years ago, the building is in good shape. The building passed its annual fire, and health and safety inspections. This past year, we have provided funds for repairs to the water heating and drinking water systems. The remaining need Patrick pointed out is to address the lack of insulation. Anyone who would like to help with this work is encouraged to contact a Board member.

Due to safety concerns, signs have been placed on the school driveway to remind drivers to proceed with caution. According to the deed donating land for the school, the school driveway is a right of way, and not a town road. The Board requests that residents use Crain Road to access Village Road.

Surry residents, the Board sincerely appreciates the support you have shown us. We welcome your input at our meetings. We meet the third Monday of the month at 7:00 at the Surry School building. Phone or email contact information is posted on front door of the school and on the school bulletin board at the Town Hall.

End-of-Year Summary: 2017

Once again, the Reed Free Library Board of Trustees is pleased to report a productive year of library offerings and growth.

In terms of physical space, the Board continued to cull texts that are no longer in active use. We have completed work on the entire adult collection and are targeting the Young Adult and children's collections for the upcoming year. Moving forward, we plan to shift the collection and library furnishings (shelving and tables) in order to allow for more floor space. We are currently discussing how best to approach this task; in effect, how we might open things up so we can host community activities with enough elbow room for everyone to move about freely and feel comfortable.

Moving outdoors in the springtime, we hired Surry Village resident Beth Leineau to plant flowers, weed and generally maintain the landscaping on either side of the entrance ramp to the library. Our thanks to Beth and her son Carver who did a fine job with this. In addition to landscaping, we also installed (thanks to Trustee Wayne Hartz) a dehumidifier in the basement – this will allow us to store materials below ground without as much risk of mildew/damage.

In terms of community involvement, the Trustees hosted an "Evening with the Players" (Surry Players, that is) in the spring. Led by longtime actor and director Mona Anderson, a group of Surry residents/actors began the evening by sharing highlights (backstage stories) and posters from the group's long history. They then invited the audience to participate in some improv onstage before the entire group went to the library for refreshments and conversation. As everyone seemed to truly enjoy the evening, we hope to sponsor a follow-up (Act II) in 2018. Beyond this, the Trustees are discussing other possible events that will help to enliven our place within Surry as more than just a lending library, but rather, as a centerpiece to our community. To this end, we gladly invite ideas for library-sponsored gatherings from town residents.

On a much more somber note, the Trustees suffered the loss of two long-term Trustees in 2017 – Harold Pike (an active Trustee at the time of his death) and former Trustee Fred Fosher. Both will be as sadly missed as they were deeply appreciated during their respective tenures on the Board.

In closing, we thank all who have contributed their time and efforts to the Reed Free Library over the past year. Additionally, we invite you to join us in welcoming our new Trustee Lynn Zimmerman, whose artistic talents are sure to be in evidence as we move into the new year together.

A notice of expiration of a Septic System Construction Approval for Tax Map 1-28 was received from NHDES. Craig and Kim Fisher appeared on behalf of the Bethel Bible Church to present plans to replace an existing barn on the parsonage property. Because the building will continue to be used for a garage and storage no Site Plan Review will be required. Nancy Balla presented preliminary plans for a boundary line adjustment and 2-lot subdivision. Eric Eichner would be willing to serve as ex-officio member of the Planning Board, however the Monday night meeting time conflicted with Selectmen's meetings.

May:

A driveway permit for Andrew and Kim Lippincott was approved. A Lot Line Adjustment and 2-Lot Subdivision, Tax Map 4B, Lots 39, 39-1 and 39-2, property of Nancy Balla on Spring Hill Lane was approved. Hugh Barrett and Shawn and Sonja Leslie presented preliminary plans for a Lot Line Adjustment. Jason Martin presented preliminary plans for a 2-Lot Subdivision. Pete Bissell was appointed by the Board of Selectmen to fill a vacancy on the planning board. Pete Bissell was elected chairman and Laura Barrett was elected secretary.

June:

A copy of a NH Department of Transportation Driveway Permit for property of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on Route 12-A, formerly known as the horse ring, was received. The Surry Fire Department brought in very early plans for an addition to the north side of the fire station. A Lot Line Adjustment, Tax Map 6, Lots 5 and 6, property of Hugh Barrett at 1 Surry Dam Road was approved. The Cemetery Committee investigated the possible location of cremains on the property. A 2-Lot Subdivision, Tax Map4C, Lot 85A and Lot 85A2, property of Jason Martin, 974 Old Walpole Road was approved. The regular meeting of the Planning Board was changed to the 4th Wednesday of each month at 7:00 pm to avoid conflict with the selectmen's meetings.

July:

Septic System Construction Approval notices were received for 674 Old Walpole Road, property of Michael Trahan and for 7 Village Road, property of Jason and Karen Whittemore.

August:

Bruce Smith presented a request to amend Article X, Section E., Variance, of the Zoning Ordinance to agree with language in NHRSA 674:33.

September:

A Septic System Approval notice for 746 Route 12-A, property of Knud and Marie Keller, was received. A Driveway Access Permit for property of Michael Trahan was received.

October:

A Driveway Application for property of Jay Crofton, Broadvest Center, at Farm Road was approved. Septic System Construction Approvals for 1 Surry Dam Road, property of Michael and Katie Powers, 95 Pond Road, property of Karen Richardson, and Farm Road, property of Shane Lampinen were received. The Road Standards Ordinance was discussed as it relates to roads that the Town currently maintains. Bob and Linda Bergevin discussed a preliminary plan to build a private road on land of Helen Smith and to subdivide that property.

November:

Bob Bergevin, acting as agent for Helen Smith, presented a preliminary plan for a two-lot subdivision on land of Mrs. Smith. Access would be from a newly constructed private road and driveway. Approval of the preliminary plan was denied due to violation of Surry Zoning Ordinance, which requires frontage on a town maintained road. Mrs. Smith could appeal to the Surry Board of Adjustment for a variance. The board voted to amend the Surry Zoning Ordinance, Article X, E., Variance to conform to statutory language.

December:

A notice of 90-day extension of Septic System Construction Permit for 674 Old Walpole Road was received. A notice of Septic System Construction permit for Tax Map 1 Lot 2-B, property of Elwood Streeter on Route 12-A was received.

Surry Conservation Commission March 2018 Annual Report to the Town

The foot bridge over Merriam Brook (on the trail that follows the west side of the Ashuelot River) was destroyed in the 2012 flood. The brook was originally about 10' wide, but has eroded to about 30-40' wide. The Army Corps has spent about \$100,000 reconstructing the Dort Road foot bridge and is out of funds. They have the materials for the Merriam Brook foot bridge. But the town would need to invest in certified engineering plans, which will cost about and provide the labor. The Commission welcomes input about this project.

A Walpole landowner bought abutting forest land along Merriam Road in Walpole and Surry. The Commission is working with them to put this nearly 200 acres into a Conservation Easement. This will guarantee that the land stays in its natural state into the future. If you are interested in doing the same with your land, or want more information about how an easement works, please contact a member.

Come spring, the Commission is planning a walking tour to examine vernal pools (seasonal pools that dry up in the summer). Amphibians lay their eggs in vernal pools because they are safe from fish. Finding salamanders would be fun for the whole family. We will plan a date with those that are interested.

The Commission again led a hike in the Graf Town Forest during Old Home Day. If you missed it, look for it at the next Old Home Day weekend, August 16-18, 2019 when we celebrate Surry's 250th anniversary. The Commission will return in spring to finish marking the boundary with red blazes so that residents can walk in the forest on their own.

The Conservation Commission, working with the NH Department of Environmental Services, the Cheshire County Conservation District, the Army Corp of Engineers, the Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee, the Monadnock Conservancy and Trout Unlimited, is committed to preserving and protecting the natural environment, flora and fauna in Surry. We participated in a UNH Extension project to inventory town-owned land and conservation easements, and participated in the annual ARLAC Ashuelot water sampling.

The Surry Commission is a member of the NH Association of Conservation Commissions. The Association has advised that state law provides a clear role for local conservation commissions to participate in environmental law enforcement. Wetlands are important to store flood waters, to filter drinking water, to prevent river bank erosion, to serve as habitat and food for animals, and to provide recreation. The Commission is monitoring a wetlands restoration project and some unpermitted possible wetlands filling sites. The Commission has commented on Wetland and Dredge-and-Fill applications before the NH Department of Environmental Services. Conservation members attended a Wetlands Permit Evaluation training sponsored by the state Commission.

If you have any questions about what you can do to preserve your land, soil, water or wildlife resources, the Conservation Commission will be glad to help. The Commission would like to present a public educational meeting for the town. If you have a topic related to the natural world you would like to learn more about, please contact us. If you have a concern about a possible environmental infraction, or want guidance in how to avoid one, please come to one of our meetings. We meet the first Monday of the month (except holidays), 7:00 PM, at the Surry Town Hall. All are welcome.

Surry Fire Department Engineer's Report



The Surry Volunteer Fire Department had another busy year in 2017 with a record total of 96 calls for service. There were no large incidents in town this year, but there were several that had the potential to become large if not mitigated timely and effectively.

We are constantly looking to improve the services we provide to the Town of Surry. This is achieved through updated tools, equipment, and continued training for all members. A new capital reserve fund for "Fire Equipment" has been requested in the town warrant. This is needed to allow us to save for large equipment expenses that would otherwise exhaust most or the entire annual operating budget. One example is our self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) bottles have a 15-year service life that will expire in the year 2020. These SCBAs are essential tools that give firefighters the ability to enter hazardous environments while breathing clean air; allowing them to perform rescues and put out fires safely.

The Surry Fire Station was built at the founding of the fire department in 1954. It was sized to hold smaller, military surplus trucks with retrofitted fire pumps and water storage. The role of the fire service today has grown immensely since those days and the apparatus that we operate have grown also. We respond to a variety of emergencies with each requiring a different set of knowledge, tools, and equipment to mitigate these incidents. Our apparatus is larger to hold more water, tools, and equipment to handle the vast array of responses. Our quarters are cramped to say the least. We have 4 vehicles in our fleet, each with its own purpose. Currently we have room for only 3 causing us to store one engine at the town highway garage.

The highway garage is not heated, forcing us to remove the water and winterize the pump. This essentially results in taking the truck out of service during the winter months. Plans are currently being developed for an expansion of the fire station. The heating system was replaced last year to correct the safety concern of spreading engine exhaust and carbon monoxide throughout the entire building. The new system allows for more control of separate zones, making it more efficient, and it is also large enough to handle the future expansion. We ask for your continued support for this project in the near future.



This year the Fire Department suffered the loss of two long time members. They were 20-year Firefighter Harold Pike and 40-year member and former Deputy Chief Roger Bienvenu. Their knowledge, experience, and friendships will truly be missed by all.

The Fire Engineers want to thank the residents of Surry for their support. We also want to thank the 26 members of the SVFD for selflessly volunteering their time, year after year, to make this department function successfully. SVFD is a 100% volunteer fire department with no compensation of any kind to any of our members. Over 800 hours of service was provided this year alone. If you are interested in joining our department please contact any member, or stop by the fire station during monthly meetings on the 2nd or 4th Monday of the month. 2017 Annual Report

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program. Members are nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES).

The **Ashuelot River Water Quality Monitoring Program** continued for its seventeenth season, in conjunction with the NHDES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP). ARLAC members, working with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session, leading to monthly sampling May through September. The Ashuelot River is classified as “Class B” meaning it is considered suitable for fishing, swimming and other recreational uses.

- We sampled 11 sites along the River’s 64-mile length, and 3 sites along the South Branch in Swanzey.
- We obtained E. coli samples from June through September and Total Phosphorous samples in August and September.
- The cost of lab analyses was covered by contributions from Conservation Commissions along the River and NHDES. A generous donation from the Filtrine Manufacturing Company enabled the purchase of new pH meters.
- Over 135 hours were logged by 18 volunteers. New volunteers are always welcome!
- A quick look at this year’s results:

E. coli: most samples met the “Class B” level for surface waters with values well below 100 MPN/100 ml from Washington downstream to the Stone Arch Bridge in Keene. At Rte 101 and downstream there were higher numbers especially in August when we had a heavy rain. September sampling showed Class A levels throughout. Numbers are frequently high after heavy rains and increased run-off.

pH levels: results continue to be acidic with most readings below the standard of 6.5, especially in the upper reaches of the Ashuelot north of Keene.

Total phosphorous: Generally samples showed low levels, but a single high reading was obtained in Marlow in September.

Dissolved oxygen, chloride, turbidity and specific conductance remained within the standard with specific conductance increasing from Keene and downstream.

As mandated by DES, **ARLAC reviews and comments on state permit applications** within the river corridor that have potential impacts on the river. Included this year were ten Wetland or Shoreland projects in the towns of Washington, Marlow, Surry, Swanzey, Winchester, and Hinsdale. We continue to follow the progress and reports regarding the West Street Dam and proposed hydro station in Keene, and have begun the review for FERC recertification of Nash Mill Hydro in Marlow.

We strive to educate ourselves on a broad array of issues associated with the river and its watershed. We hope to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities. Members participated in the state LAC annual workshop and regional and state-wide meetings covering topics such as NH Instream Flow Protection rules, DES listed impaired rivers, and flood resiliency and stream restoration. Members also viewed a Trout Unlimited educational video on “Basic Stream and River Functions”. College student projects offered useful insights about the

river and its habitats. We reviewed a report on the pH and conductivity graphs by a NHTI student. We also reviewed research done by KSC students on wildlife corridors along the Ashuelot in Keene and Swanzey. Dr. Denise Burchsted presented student obtained data on microplastics in the river.

The **Annual River cleanup** took place September 15 and 16 in conjunction with the Connecticut River Conservancy's Source to the Sea Clean-up. ARLAC co-sponsored the event with the Cheshire County Conservation District and the City of Keene. 76 volunteers collected over two tons of trash in Marlow, Keene and Swanzey.

We continue to have a Facebook presence as the *Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee*. River monitoring data can be viewed at des.nh.gov/organization/divisions/water/wmb/vrap/ashuelot/index.htm. E. coli results are posted during the monitoring season at www.ctriver.us.

ARLAC meets the third Tuesday monthly at 7 P. M. at the Keene Public Library. We invite citizens and town officials to contact their local ARLAC representatives with any concerns or interest in participating as a town representative.

Article 02: Zoning Amendment

Are you in favor of amending ARTICLE II Definitions of the Surry Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, by replacing B. with the following?

B. Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) means a second independent dwelling unit, attached or detached, which is permitted by a land use control regulation to be located on the same lot, plat, site, or other division of land as the permitted single-family principal dwelling unit.

The purpose of this change is to shorten the wording so it is limited to a definition. The regulation removed is included in the following article to be considered.

Article passed.

Article 03: Zoning Amendment

Are you in favor of amending ARTICLE VII Supplemental Regulations of the Surry Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, by adding the following?

F. Accessory Dwelling Units

1. The Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) will be no larger than 750 square feet of living space, additionally the total area of all porches/decks/etc. combined can be no larger than 30 percent of the accessory dwelling living area.
2. No third floors are allowed on self-standing buildings.
3. The ADU shall have an independent means of ingress and egress, or shall have ingress and egress through a common space such as a shared hallway to an exterior door.

4. Either the ADU or the principal dwelling unit shall be the principal residence and legal domicile of the owner of the property. If either of the units fails to be owner-occupied, then the property must comply with the zoning requirements for a multi-family dwelling.
5. The ADU shall be provided a minimum of 2 off-street parking spaces.
6. The ADU shall make provision for adequate water supply and sewage disposal service in compliance with RSA 485-A:38 and regulations adopted by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services.
7. The ADU shall comply with all lot setback requirements.

The purpose of this change is to adapt our current provisions for accessory dwelling units with RSA 674:72 that takes effect June 1, 2017.

B. Smith – No need for it to be a separate article. Made a tour on Mondays, roads held up well this winter. Two things for this year. Expecting to get approval for lower Pond Road at a good price and based on what we've seen, looking to rebuilding Joslin Road, raise it up so water doesn't pool.

J. Davis – But you have no permission for road extensions.

B. Smith – No yet but is looking good right now.

J. Davis – Propose we make this appropriation \$50,000. They have no plans right now.

\$100,000 is too much money to spend on that road.

Moderator - Are you proposing that we amend the article to \$444, 916?

B. Smith – Understand but we're not putting any money into a fund

J. Davis – You're looking to do a project that costs \$60,000 you have \$100,000 for it. That leaves \$40,000. If something goes wrong, there's no money and you have no wetlands permit.

Moderator - Need you to tell me exactly the amendment that you want to make to the article.

We will vote on it if it's seconded.

J. Davis – Drop the appropriate sum to \$444,916 by reducing the sum by \$50,000.

Second: F. Conroy

Discussion on Amendment:

C. Lothrop: Need clarification: The sums don't match the number in the article.

B. Smith – The spread sheet is comprehensive

B. Bergeron – B Smith said he checked the roads, Surry Dam Road is pathetic, what do they want to spend the money on?

Moderator: Right now we are discussing whether or not you want to amend the article by \$50,000.

R. Fiorey – Last couple of years we've appropriated \$100,000 and the selectmen have always had a list, but this year there is no list.

J. Croteau – Trying to get to the \$260,000 for lower Pond Road. Decided that we need to scale back this year. Confident that we can get that road opened for less money. Not going to see fancy work, but it can be done. Figure comes in at about \$60,000. Would like to use that money to work on Pond Road, do some work on Joslyn Road, East Surry Rad. Would like to use the rest of the \$100,000 to do other projects around town.

B. Smith – Might not need to open lower Pond road.

J. Brooks – Roads are not in good shape, upper Pond road is ridiculous. Would not be in favor or reducing the amount by \$50,000.

J. Davis – I work on the roads, they are ridiculous. Pot holes, etc. danger is this lower Pond Road project, we go to fix it it might cost way over \$60,000. The permit is for over \$265,000. They have a scaled down project that will probably work but they will still need a wetland permit. It's ongoing so we haven't been fined by wetlands. The project they have now is to stay out of the wetlands.

Amended article: Are you in favor or amending the article to ready: To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$444,916.00 with a reduction coming from line 4909.

Vote: Amendment did not pass.

Original article:

C. Lothrop wanted to discuss whether or not the town wanted to stop the work on lower Pond road and concentrate on other roads.

Moderator – That can be brought up at the end of the meeting. We can't entertain that at this time.

S. Sweeney – The two amounts that aren't recommended for fire and welfare. Why are they not recommended and why are they in there?

B. Smith – Need to account for the fire equipment. Fire got a lower estimate than what they put in for, the other item – we received requests for good Samaritans, and other social service agencies for \$6400 or so. We got approval for \$3200.

Vote: Passed.

Article 06: Town Hall Capital Reserve

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to place into the existing Town Hall and Carriage Shed Capital Reserve Fund established in 2015, for the purpose of addition/reconstruction/remodeling the town hall and attached carriage shed. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Discussion: **B. Smith** in 2019 we have the 250th celebration for the town. We've done a lot for the town hall and we need to do something structurally for the shed. Trees, etc., rough outline from 1979 – turn it into office for the town clerk would give us more room in the town hall for storage and we could install a handicap accessible bathroom downstairs. If we need to do something with the shed, we need this money.

F. Buffum - What's the current balance in this fund?

B. Smith - \$15,088.

B. Russell: What other items do you need to see coming up? Fire equipment, town equipment, roads, replace bridge on East Surry Road. Is all of our equipment going to break at the same time?

C. Lothrop – Can we get an answer from the highway dept?

D. Clark – We have a truck and a tractor, everything else is rented out.

D. Lane – From the budget committee – when the day comes if we're short we'll put the difference in a warrant, it's not a tactic and we'll raise what we'll need.

C. Lothrop – What if the truck becomes unusable?

J. Croteau /D. Clark– We rent one.

Discussion: C. Lothrop – Estimate on how long it would take to plow, maintain the ditches and drainage ponds, etc.

D. Clark – 15-20 minutes to plow it. Salt is 250lbs per mile. Can't tell you about the ditches.

G. Morin – Did the people who built their houses know it was a private road at the time?

B. Patnode – Anyone who built out there knows that it's a private road. It's a private subdivision we charge \$100 per person, so.

J. Davis- Don't agree with the selectmen, not a lot of rules about maint, but 5 years of non-maint. on ponds and they become abandoned ponds. Requires wetland permits to work on them. Recommend that the ponds/roads be brought up to current standards before taking on responsibility. Three of the ponds are already over 5 years old.

Moderator: Are you proposing an amendment to an article? There are no stipulations in the article, it's voted on as written.

D. Lane - If selectmen and Durwin understand all the rules about who is supposed to maintain them? The ponds? It's not town land, it's private land they are on.

B. Smith – Talked to the same person John talked to, was not aware that there was a home association on these areas, Maybe someone can shed some light on this? The ponds are not included in the right of way.

B. Bergeron - What do ponds have to do with the roads. The article says the roads.

J. Davis - In the beginning with the permits that had to be filed, look at the writing, there are right of ways down at the registry about Barbara Patnode transferring the ponds etc to the town. There's 26 culverts out there, it's all part of the project. There is a provision in the home owner association that the drainage is part of the plan.

E. Payne – To clarify the ponds, they are a storage for water with a drainage pipe and a stand pipe in the pond so you need to make sure that pipe is accessible and the outlet is accessible so there is no cost involved. Relatively minimal maintenance.

W. Russell – Retention does not refer just to water. Dirt, sand, etc will reduce retention. Silt will have to be removed. Do not know how frequently this will need to be done.

L. Patnode: Ponds are 7 years old and have not needed to be done yet.

G. Morin – Motion to lay on the table this article on Cider Mill Road.

Second – C. Lothrop

Vote: 19 in favor

Opposed: 23

Abstain : 2

Motion is defeated.

J. Davis - Roads were not thrown up, they were dedicated and presented to the planning

board. Now they've been built and they want the town to take over.

To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Class V Road, the road named Mason Drive, in the Patnode subdivision. The Selectmen have been advised by a licensed civil engineer that it was constructed in accordance with Surry's Road Standards Ordinance as excepted by vote at 2009 town meeting reducing road width from 24 to 20 feet as recommended by the Planning Board. C. Lothrop – Hand vote to do all the roads first or lower Pond Road first.

Money not be used at all for lower pond road and be used on all other roads: 21

Other Business

J. Croteau –Shed – big project or office space with bathrooms. We can basically put some paint on the shed and maintain it or rebuild it and put the town clerk out there.

Discussion:

J. Davis - Hugh Clark showed me a plot of land behind the town hall that is not part of the cemetery. Would be more money, but with all the paperwork that everyone that has ever worked for this town has, it would be well worth it. Shed could be fortified easily to continue to make it viable for equipment storage.

B. Bergeron – Why not have the selectmen make up an advisory committee?

Vote: Repair what you have and make an office behind the town hall.

Discussion:

Roads:

Joslyn road needs work, don't think that Pond Road should be fixed.

A few minutes won't save any time.

Done pretty well without that road being opened.

Road is a very important road. Only one way in and one way out. (fire chief)

Fire doubles in size every two minutes. Not a big fan of spending 250,000 on that road, but if it can be repaired for 60,000 it would be money well spent.

Selectmen should travel around with John and see where it's best to put that money to use.

Question for Josh – seen a lot of people get stuck, they can't get up the road. We're going to spend 60,000 to repair the culvert but we can deal with other issues later. What about the school access road.

It's not big enough.

The army corp has the right to flood that road, we can't raise it. If can reasonably fix it for 60,000 were for it but not 200,000.

Two or three times that road has flooded, has it been destroyed all three times? Army Corp of engineers owns the land? They own part of the land. It's been five years since the road was destroyed. Five years on non-maintenance, isn't a class VI road? July 1st.

Information: M. Fisher – The sign pictured on the town report cover book is wrong – Lily pond is 18 feet deep, not 80 feet deep. Miners never found gold or silver, the land had been salted. They found mica. Tried to get the state to fix the sign, they don't have the money.

J. Croteau – I'd like to recognize Virginia Clark 51 years of service. Flowers and a gift presented.

V. Clark – I don't know what to say. I'm surprised, but after 51 years on work, I need to retire. Thank you.

The Town Report; as old as local government itself. Shown hanging on mailboxes on Old Walpole Road, our report is delivered to every home in town. State law says that the report must be made available to citizens a week before the Town Meeting. Many towns mail them and some towns put out a pile in the town hall or library and have people pick them up. Surry has a tradition of delivering them to every home prior to the statutory deadline, a task that for many years was done by the local Boy Scouts but a few years ago when the local Troop was no longer able to disperse them, the Selectmen took over the duty. There are 320 reports printed, all but 20 are delivered with one copy retained permanently as a historical document, two copies go to the state library, and the remainders are left at the Town Hall for anyone who would like a copy throughout the year.

The Town Report is an opportunity to reflect on the years accomplishments and to lay out the next years challenges. Also it allows citizens an opportunity to be familiar with town affairs and warrant articles so that they can execute their freedom of speech at town meeting as depicted by this classic painting by Norman Rockwell titled "Freedom Of Speech (1943)". The man stands at town meeting to voice his opinion as our democracy allows. Notice the town report tucked into his jacket pocket.
