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Message from the Selectmen

The year 2020 will always be remembered for the crazy year that it was. Covid-19 affected us all even though there were few cases reported in Surry. Businesses closed, school children learning remotely, social distancing, and working from home all are taking a toll on us financially and psychologically. We are into this now for a year and there is still uncertainty as to when it will end and things can return to a new normal. We here in the Selectman's office have persevered without missing a Monday meeting and continue to get done the things that are essential to our community. We held our weekly meetings as normal with an emphasis on making an appointment to better and more safely serve you. As you might already know, annual town voting and Town Meeting have been postponed until June 8 and June 10 respectively. This will allow more people to be vaccinated prior to an in-person meeting and also give us time, hopefully, for the covid risk to subside.

Last year we made some improvements to the highway garage. A well was installed and a new re-fueling pad was installed. There has never been running water at the highway garage before. Having water there will make maintenance on the town equipment easier and more effective and the re-fueling pad will safeguard from accidental spills leaching into the environment.

The lower part of the Joslin Rd. was started to be rebuilt last year. The road surface was ground and there were a few trees and stumps removed to improve the ditch line and water runoff. This project will be continued this year. The road bed will be improved and ultimately, paving will be done on this portion.

We are due this year for a town wide property revaluation. This happens every five years. We expect with the homes currently selling far above town assessed values you will see in an overall increase in your property valuation.

The State is continuing to work on a solution for school funding aid to the towns. There are three plans being discussed in Concord now and it is unclear which one will gain traction and be brought before the house for a vote. Surry should benefit from any of the plans which will provide more state funds to offset the cost that the Surry taxpayer must provide for educating our children. We encourage you to research these plans and contact our representatives to voice your opinion. This is the biggest issue we face right now in our community. The number of school age children continues to rise and with it our tax rate. Surry, once known for having a low rate compared to other towns in New Hampshire is poised to be among the top ten highest this year. We plan on staying on top of this and doing what we can to make sure Surry will benefit from the state legislative action.

We would like to thank all Surry residents for their patience as we navigate these challenging times. The social distancing and mask wearing will be over soon. Also, like to thank all the town officials who persevered throughout the year to get it done. Stay tuned for updates on Old Home Day this year and maybe we can finally get back to the social community that we are. Wishing you the best in 2021.

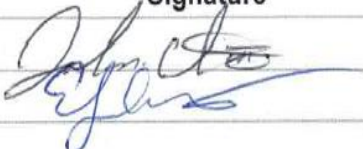

Article 01 Elect Officers

To choose all necessary Town officers as listed on the official ballot.

Article 02 Hear Reports

To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees.

Article 03 Operating Budget

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$597,474 for general municipal operations. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 04 Highway Equip CRF

To see if the town will vote to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 1992. (Majority vote required).

Article 05 Highway Equip CRF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed into the existing Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of



highway equipment with said funds to come from unassigned fund balance. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee

recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 06 Fire Truck CRF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to be placed into the existing Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a future fire truck with said funds to come from unassigned fund balance. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 07 Property Revaluation CRF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed into the existing Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund to pay for a future town wide property revaluation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 08 Establish Town Forest

To see if the Town will vote to establish as a town forest, as provided in RSA 31:110, land located on Surry Mountain acquired by tax collector's deed as recorded at the Registry of Deeds in book 3063 page 675, believed to contain about 114.725 acres and shown on tax map 3 lot 7-B. (Majority vote required).



Article 09 Manage Town Forest

To see if the Town will vote to authorize, as provided in RSA 31:112 II, the Surry Conservation Commission (created March 9, 1971) to manage lot 3-7-B located on Surry Mountain, if that property is established as a town forest under Article 7 of this Town Warrant. (Majority vote required).

Article 10 Conservation Commission Option

Shall the town vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 36-A:4-a, I(b) to authorize the conservation commission to expend funds for contributions to 'qualified organizations' for the purchase of property interests, or facilitating transactions related thereto, where the property interest is to be held by the qualified organization and the town will retain no interest in the property? (Majority vote required).

Article 11 Other Business

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

To the residents of the Town of Surry:

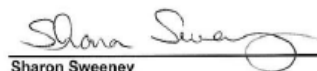
The trust funds continue to be managed by New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool (NHPDIP) and Charter Trust Company. The Trustees continually review the funds and are pleased with the performance of these investment managers. Very low interest rates diminished the earnings on the NHPDIP funds for this year, as those funds are very conservatively invested. However, the school funds invested with Charter Trust showed considerable growth.

The Trustees continue to work with the Cemetery Trustees on both general maintenance and perpetual care reimbursements to the Town. For 2020, the Town was reimbursed \$464.14 for general maintenance care of the trust fund lots.

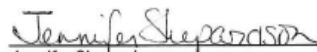

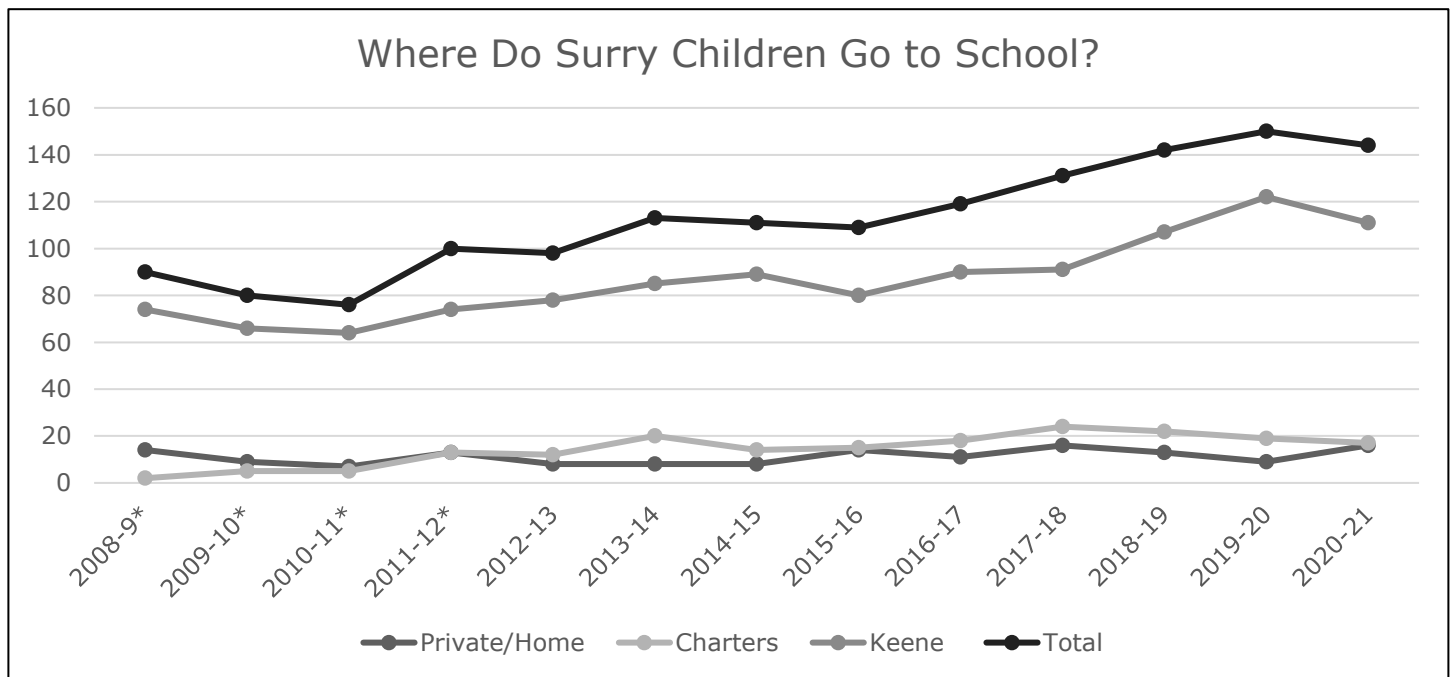

March 2021 Annual Report of the Surry School District Officers

The Annual Surry School District Business Meeting will be on Thursday, March 11, 2021, 7:00 pm at the Surry Town Hall. The copies of the Warrant Articles and the Budget will be posted and available on the Surry website.

This year is the thirteenth year of the Surry School District, SAU 91. As of January first, there are one hundred twelve Surry students attending in Keene. Nine Surry students are tuitioned privately, seven are home schooled, and seventeen attend area charter schools. We regretfully accepted the retirement of District Clerk Helen Smith last winter, and were greatly saddened by her passing last summer. She was with us from the beginning and was the foundation of all our work. We depended heavily on her attention to detail and her gentle nudges about state deadlines.

Every year, more families with children move to Surry. The pandemic has created a unique situation. In the fall, seven new children arrived in Keene schools, while fifteen left (choosing home school, other schools or moving away). However, we expect some of the fifteen to return next year and more families to continue to move to Surry.



The educational needs of Surry students are primary focus of the Board. Keene principals report that Surry students have assimilated without issue and are doing well. This year we evaluated bussing options and joined a consortium of area school districts to bid collectively on transportation costs.

The number of school-age and preschool-age students who need special services is increasing each year. Beginning this year, one student with complex special education needs is attending a day program at the only school available, which is out of state. We also supply special education services to students at the Surry Village Charter School. Providing services to preschoolers has helped them catch up so that they enter kindergarten level with their peers.

Surry School District continues to be administered by Superintendent Ken Dassau, Ed. D., who also acts as the District’s Special Education Coordinator, and business services are provided by Brian Gallagher. The annual financial audit done

by CPAs at Vashon Clukay found our accounts to be in order. The Surry School District is under contract with the Keene School District to send all its public school students to Keene. State law requires the School District to provide a public education for Surry resident students. Families planning changes in their children's education are encouraged to contact the School Board ahead of time using the town website www.surry.nh.gov. This way the School Board can determine whether tuition due will be the responsibility of the School District or the family.

The building inspection a few years ago found that the physical structure was in good shape, but pointed out the lack of insulation. Although the building passed its annual fire and health and safety inspections, building components are wearing out and in need of repair. The furnace and water system have been repaired. We have replaced two failed room heaters with energy-efficient heaters that will circulate fresh air as necessary in this Covid environment. We also removed five trees in danger of falling. The School Board assumes the costs of repairs of major system failures and the Charter School assumes the costs of maintenance and utilities. The Board and the SVCS split the cost of repairing the floor in the janitor's closet.

For the safety of the children, and to protect the integrity of the school driveway, the School Board reminds residents that the school driveway is not a public road. Signs have been posted at both ends of the driveway specifying that the driveway is for school access only.

Surry residents, the Board sincerely appreciates the support you have shown us. We welcome your input at our meetings. We meet the third Monday of the month at 7:00 at the Surry School building.

The current Board of Trustees, led by Chair Karyn Hagen, including Lynn Zimmerman (Treasurer), Marie Keller (Secretary), Becky Huntley, Jayme Hines, and Kelly Reeves, and librarian, Carolyn Locke, present our year-end report pleased to have accomplished certain things in spite of the pandemic. We could not have done all of it without our now former board members. Prudence Cuper (Secretary and former Chair, who served since 2009), and Gareth Williams (Treasurer, who served since 2000) both stepped down in June, having proved to be models of heartfelt dedication, fastidious record-keeping, and friendship. Surry Planning Board 2020 Year in Review

January:

Reviewed a real estate listing which advertised a large farmhouse with 2 large apartments in town. It was believed that the property had one approved accessory dwelling unit. The Planning Board agreed to notify the Selectmen of the apparent violation. Held a Public Hearing regarding proposed changes to the Road Standards Ordinance. The board voted to submit the proposed changes to the Warrant for Town Meeting.

February:

Dave Bergeron appeared with a preliminary proposal for a 2-lot subdivision on Wilber Road currently owned by multiple members of the Bergeron/MacKenzie family. The proposed reconfiguration would result in one lot having less than the required 200 feet of frontage on a Class 5 road. The Planning Board voted to send Mr. Bergeron to the Zoning Board of Adjustment to seek a variance. Zane White appeared and inquired about requirements for development of his property on Route 12. He was asked to return for Site Plan Review approval when he has decided on a development plan. Bruce Smith appeared with information about building moratoriums in New Hampshire to control student population. The New Hampshire laws for imposing a building moratorium would not apply to the situation in Surry.

March:

A joint public hearing was opened between the Zoning Board of Adjustment and the Planning Board regarding a request for a variance and subdivision submitted by Dave Bergeron for the Bergeron/MacKenzie property on Wilber Road. Due to social distancing requirements recommended by federal and state governments to reduce the spread the Covid-19 pandemic, the hearing was postponed to May 27, 2020. The Planning Board elected officers, Pete Bissell, chairman and Laura Barrett, secretary.

April:

No meeting.

May:

Continuation of the joint public hearing regarding the request for variance and subdivision of the Bergeron/MacKenzie property on Wilber Road was opened. The applicants were not present. The original applications were examined and discussed. The joint public hearing was continued to June 24, 2020. The Planning Board approved a driveway permit for improving a driveway on the Old Walpole Road property of Jason Martin.

June:

The joint public hearing regarding the request for variance and subdivision of the Bergeron/Mackenzie property on Wilber Road was continued to July 22, 2020. A preliminary application for subdivision of property of Bill and Martha Bigelow on Village and Crain Roads was received. The proposed subdivision would not meet the lot size and dimension requirements of the Zoning Ordinance. The planning board voted to send the applicants to the Zoning Board of Adjustment to seek a variance.

July:

Continuation of the joint public hearing regarding the request for variance and subdivision of the Bergeron/MacKenzie property on Wilber Road was opened. The Zoning Board of Adjustment voted to approve the variance with conditions. The Planning Board approved the 2-lot subdivision.

August:

Received a copy of the State of New Hampshire's 10 year highway plan showing work is scheduled for the bridge on Route 12 in 2023.

September:

Approved a driveway permit for Jeremiah Ketola/Alotek on Mine Ledge Road.

October:

Bruce Smith addressed the board about concerns over the growth of the student population and subsequent real estate tax increase. He suggested that the Planning Board consider increasing the minimum lot size requirement for future development to slow student population growth.

November:

Discussed locating and reviewing the town's master plan and examining the zoning ordinance language regarding manufactured housing and mobile homes.

December:

Meeting cancelled due to rising community spread of Covid 19.

Surry Conservation Commission March 2021 Annual Report to the Town

The Conservation Commission works with the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES), the Cheshire County Conservation District, the Army Corp of Engineers, the Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC), the Monadnock Conservancy, and Trout Unlimited, to preserve and protect the natural environment, flora and fauna in Surry. One of our members serves on the ARLAC and participates in the annual Ashuelot water sampling. Another member serves on the board of the NH Association of Conservation Commissions and helps put on the annual conference.

Last year, the Commission wrote a letter in support of the conservation acquisition of more than 1350 acres on Surry Mountain by the Nature Conservancy. They have raised most of the \$3.6 million needed. The Commission would like to contribute \$10,000 from the Conservation Fund to support this effort, as about 50 acres is in Surry. To enable this, there is an article before the voters to authorize the Commission to make donations to “qualifying organizations” according RSA 36-A:4-a. Qualifying organizations are conservation land trusts such as the Nature Conservancy. If the voters provide this authority, there would be a public hearing prior to any donation. The Commission urges the town to approve this warrant article.

The Commission submitted a grant proposal, authored by Lesley, to begin trail building in the Graf Town Forrest. The Student Conservation Association would have done the work. Unfortunately, the application was declined. The Trails Committee wanted to see a bigger project and evidence of public interest. This was a good first attempt and we will try again next year.

Conservation assistance is being provided to landowners of nearly 200 acres of forest land along Merriam Rd., the owners of the village hayfield, and the owners of land abutting the Graf Forest. These easements would guarantee that these lands will stay in their present state into the future. If you are interested in doing the same, or want more information about easements, please contact a member.

Wetlands are important to store flood waters, to filter drinking water, to prevent river bank erosion, to serve as habitat and food for animals, and to provide recreation. The Commission assists DES in monitoring wetlands restoration projects and assessing Wetland and Dredge-and-Fill applications.

The Town recently gave the Commission authority to manage the Wright Grove. We have taken down dangerous trees and done maintenance work, in addition to the fencing put up for Old Home Day.

If you have any questions about what you can do to preserve your land, soil, water or wildlife resources, the Conservation Commission will be glad to help. The Commission would like to present a public educational meeting for the town. If you have a topic related to the natural world you would like to learn more about, please contact us. If you have a concern about a possible environmental infraction, or want guidance in how to avoid one, please come to one of our meetings. We meet the first Monday of the month (except holidays), 7:00 PM, at the Surry Town Hall. All are welcome.

2020 REPORT OF THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES



Slate and Stone Restoration Project: The budget for the cemeteries was substantially reduced; thereby requiring an abatement of this year's portion of work to be completed. The 2017 Cemeteries Assessment has clearly shown significant restorative work was required for a large portion of the tipped, sagging, or cracked slate and stone markers of each cemetery. We remain hopeful to achieve monies in future years to include this important work, as Father Time and Climate march onward deteriorating grave markers and headstones.

All Patriotic display of markers and flags were placed just before Memorial Day, with assistance by volunteer effort. We are grateful for those efforts. Any and all citizens are welcome to participate in this tradition, by contacting the Sexton.

Three large trees in the Village cemetery continue to drop heavy limbs, breaking and falling onto the stone markers. While trees are a beautiful addition, age and condition of the trees will continue to wreck havoc, unless removed. These must be removed in 2021 to prevent further damage and expensive repairs.

A new backpack leaf blower and new riding lawn mower were purchased to replace failing old equipment that was unrepairable.



The Cemetery Trustees worked with the Trustees of the Trust Funds to ensure cemetery trust funds were in order and that expenditures were properly accounted.

During the onset of the Covid-19 Pandemic, our cemeteries remained assessable to the public. Funerals were held, under the NH guidelines, and under the guidance of local funeral mortuaries. We thank them for taking all required precautions and managing family services within those guidelines.

A reminder to our residents and families who have loved ones interred in Surry: the removal of flags/ dead flowers and portable containers occurs the weekend following Veteran's Day in November for winter clean-

up, along with removal of all strewn trash. Surry cemeteries are open to the Public for personal visitation, not a place for littering, dumping refuse, partaking alcohol, drugs, or engaging in vandalism or stealing flowers, decorative pots, or urns. We *strongly* encourage residents if they 'see something, say something!' – call 9-1-1 for the State Police, if you do not feel comfortable confronting a perpetrator!

Thank you to our Sexton Durwin Clark and his assistant, wife Elizabeth for completing cemetery maintenance and sexton duties. And, appreciation to the Selectmen, Secretary Jill Lane, and Trustees of the Trust Funds who provide valuable information, and support.

Surry Fire Department 2020 Engineer's Report



January 20, 2021

This past year has been an extremely busy one for the Fire Department. There have been several unusual challenges that we have faced and taken on simultaneously. Throughout these challenges, our dedicated workforce of 32 volunteers continue to respond to help our friends and neighbors in their time of greatest need.

COVID-19

It goes without saying that 2020 was a challenging year for everyone. The COVID-19 pandemic has stressed nearly every aspect of everyday life and our town has not gone unscathed. The fire department has seen the effects of this terrible virus first hand as we respond to those who have been exposed. We continue to adapt to the evolving CDC guidelines and updated Emergency Medical Services (EMS) practices. We obtained additional PPE to protect our EMTs and altered some response criteria to ensure proper response without unnecessary exposures. We strive to provide the best service possible to our citizens while keeping our volunteers safe.

Fire Truck Replacement

This year has also brought big challenges to the fire department unrelated to the pandemic. Engine 1, our 1987 International Fire Truck, failed its annual pump test. Due to the severity of the problem, cost of repair, and the age of the truck, it was not feasible to fix. The Engineers immediately began a search for a replacement engine that would fit our needs within our available budget. Part of the logistics of this process was to enable the Selectmen to expend from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund through a special town meeting. The approval of that warrant article enabled the Fire Department to act swiftly when a suitable truck was found. We have purchased a pre-owned truck with low miles/hours that better suits our current needs. The total cost of this Engine will be \$115,400, leaving over \$100,000 in the reserve fund for future use. Thank you to all who participated in this process with their inquiries and support.

Fire Station Project

You will notice the Fire Station and the property has gone through some major changes this past year. With fundraising efforts surpassing \$100,000, it was decided to put the project out to bid to get official numbers. Unfortunately, the first round came back much higher than expected. The main cause cited was the rapidly increasing cost of building supplies due to the pandemic. Due to the higher than expected cost, we decided to re-define the scope of the project and break it into phases. Phase 1 is the shell of the building; weather tight, heated, with a functional bathroom. Phase 2 to be the completion of the interior and finishes. The bid was put out a second time with the updated scope and phase breakdown. A noticeable increase was present in several line items from the first round of bids received a month earlier. The engineers and committee decided that with the ever increasing costs of building materials, that we execute a contract with the low bid contractor, DA Brothers of Swanzey, and complete phase 1 of the building expansion.

In Kind Contributions

A lot of work to date has been completed by the members themselves with much help from In-Kind contributions of Surry Businesses. The needed area was cleared of trees, stumped, and leveled. A new septic was designed, installed, and plumbed into the addition space. Dozens of Large boulders hidden in the ground made for significant challenges in digging the septic field and foundation.

A huge thank you to Brooks Construction for the work performed to clear the lot, install the septic, and excavation for the foundation. Thank you to White's Grounds Keeping for chipping away at the boulders, MME Construction and Frank Lucius Construction for use of your special equipment. The combination of the member's volunteer hours and in-kind contributions of these contractors have saved the town upwards of \$50,000 towards this project.



EOC Grant

The Fire Station is the town's designated Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in the event of a major incident or widespread disaster in Surry. Through Surry's Emergency Management Director (EMD) and NH Emergency Management, we have applied for a FEMA grant for outfitting an EOC. If awarded, this will offset some costs of the work directly related to the EOC. With the completion of phase 2, this grant will cover \$98,045 worth of items to include a new generator, base station radio, and various equipment/furnishings. The grant requirement for a 50% match has already been met by the rest of the project and SVFD member's time.

Current Project Status

The septic, foundation, plumbing, and preparation of the existing building is complete and ready for framing. By the time this report is published, we hope to have the renovation to appear complete from the outside. The inside of the station will not be finished, but it will be weather tight and heated. The total combined cost of Phase 1 & 2 with last year's bid prices is \$425,000. This price includes all of our cost avoidance and being awarded the EOC grant. To date we have raised around \$315,000 which includes the \$200,000 municipal funding from the town. Once phase 1 is complete, we will reevaluate how to move forward and complete the remainder of the project in the most timely and economical way.



2021 Warrant Article

This year our sole warrant article request is our ongoing annual contribution to our Fire Truck Capital reserve fund. If we did not have this fund available this past year, we would not have been able to act to replace Engine 1 when we needed it.

ARLAC Annual Report: 2020

ARLAC members continue to monitor permits and projects throughout the Ashuelot River corridor. Volunteers conducted water quality testing during summer months and participated in the annual Ashuelot River Cleanup.

PERMITS: ARLAC reviewed for a variety of impacts to the river corridor.

- Eversource pole replacement near the river in Keene and woody vegetation mowing along power lines from Keene to Hinsdale, (approved).
- Development of three home sites on Ashuelot Pond; (plans modified to protect vernal pools, shoreland cutting and culvert size for wildlife).
- Bank stabilization and wildlife habitat improvement on farmland property in Hinsdale (approved with site visit follow-up).
- Roadway construction violation in Lempster (filed complaint, unpermitted headwall on bank of the river); roadway culvert maintenance in Marlow (approved).
- Herbicide spraying for vegetation control at Surry Mt. Dam (approved allowing spot treatment and stump treatment only).
- Island St. Bridge and Winchester Street roundabout construction in Keene; (Comments resulted in plans for the planting of live stakes on banks; deep sumps in 8 offline catch basins allowing run-off to be treated; bioretention system to be located in Winchester St. median).
- FERC permitting of Marlow Hydro Dam and resolution of Fiske Mill Dam (informational only, no action).
- Winchester Learning Center trail system and parking lot (approved).
- West Swanzey road reconstruction and impact on wetlands (approved).

PROJECTS: ARLAC initiated and monitored several projects along the river corridor.

- DOT floodplain mitigation project in Keene of 19.9 acre feet (participated in the decision-making process).
- ARLAC helped determine where monitoring transects are to be located for Instream Flow project determining the minimum flows for cold and warm-water fisheries on the river.
- Corridor Management Plan: ARLAC will work with SWRPC to update this plan. Preliminary 604b Water Quality Planning funds have been approved.
- Clean Water Act Draft 303d list: Lists impaired river segments, most recent being low pH.

ARLAC PROGRAMS:

- Monthly river monitoring was conducted by 17 volunteers June through September. Readings of pH continue to be low indicating impairment for acidity. Instances of elevated E.coli occurred in Keene (June, July) and Swanzey (Aug, Sept). Readings of Specific Conductance (measures ions in the water) continued to show moderate to high impact in Keene continuing downstream to the mouth of the river. Dissolved oxygen, Total Phosphorus and Chloride remain above Class B standards. Complete data can be viewed under annual reports at <https://www.des.nh.gov/water/rivers-and-lakes/river-and-lake-monitoring>.
- Source-to-Sea River Cleanup on September 26th. 45 volunteers removed 1,585 pounds of trash from the Ashuelot and Beaver Brook on this date.

APPLICABLE RSAs (in part)

RSA 21-J:19 II (in part) A written or printed report of every completed audit shall be made to the proper local officials including a summary of the findings and recommendations of the auditors and a copy of such summary shall be published in the next annual report following the fiscal year in which the audit was completed.

RSA 31:25 (in part) The trustees shall formally adopt an investment policy for all investments made by them or by their agents for any trust funds in their custody in conformance with the provisions of applicable statutes. Such investment policy shall be reviewed and confirmed at least annually. A copy of the investment policy shall be filed with the attorney general.

RSA 41:25 II. Town clerks shall deposit all fees received with the town treasurer or in a municipal account controlled by the town treasurer at least monthly, or as directed by the selectmen, for the use of the town. In the event that any portion of the town clerk's compensation consists of statutory fees, the clerk shall submit an invoice for the amount of those fees to the treasurer, who shall pay out that amount to the clerk, notwithstanding RSA 32.

RSA 41:9, VII. The selectmen shall annually review and adopt an investment policy for the investment of public funds in conformance with applicable statutes and shall advise the treasurer of such policies.

RSA 41:29, IV. Whenever the town treasurer has in custody an excess of funds which are not immediately needed for the purpose of expenditure, the town treasurer shall invest the same in accordance with the investment policy adopted by the selectmen under RSA 41:9, VII,.....

RSA 41:29, VI. The treasurer may delegate deposit, investment, recordkeeping, or reconciliation functions to other town officials or employees provided such delegation is in writing and includes written procedures acceptable to the selectmen, or in the case of a town operating under RSA 37, to the town manager, and is agreeable to all parties involved. However any such delegation shall only be made to a town official or employee bonded in accordance with RSA 41:6 and rules adopted by the commissioner of revenue administration under RSA 541-A. Such delegation shall not eliminate the responsibility of the treasurer to comply with all statutory duties required by law.

41:31-a Purpose. Financial audits play a fundamentally vital role in helping to preserve the integrity of the public finance functions and by maintaining citizens' confidence in their elected leaders. Properly performed audits provide independent assurance that financial information presented is reliable.

41:31-b Choice; Election. Any municipality that has not hired an auditor under RSA 21-J:19 shall, at the annual meeting, under an article in the warrant, choose one or more auditors. The terms of office shall be staggered so that after the year of adoption one auditor shall be chosen for a term of office for the same number of years as there are auditors on the board, provided however that in the year of adoption the members of the board shall be chosen for varying terms so that the term of one member shall expire in the next succeeding year, the term of the second member, the next year, and so on for the number of years as there are members of the board. The auditor or board of auditors shall perform the duties under RSA 41:31-c and RSA 41:31-d. If a municipality has adopted an official ballot for the election of its officers, the election of an auditor or board of auditors shall not take place until the annual meeting following the meeting at which the provisions of this section are adopted.

41:31-c Duties I. All municipalities shall annually, or more often as necessary, conduct an audit of the accounts of any officer or agent handling funds of the municipality. Elected auditors conducting such audits shall follow audit procedures in rules adopted by the commissioner pursuant to RSA 541-A.

II. Any municipality, or any political subdivision exclusively within a municipality, with a population of fewer than 750 as of the most recent federal census, provided a financial statement audit is not required by another law, regulation, or contract, may, not less than 45 days before the end of the fiscal year, petition the commissioner to waive the annual audit requirement for that fiscal year and provide an alternative plan for reviewing the municipality's financial accounts. If the commissioner approves the scope of services as proposed by the municipality, such services shall be completed by either the locally elected auditor or a CPA. If the commissioner does not approve or no alternative procedures or scope of services is provided by the municipality, then the commissioner shall determine the appropriate scope of services.

41:31-d Reports I. A complete report of any audit or procedure conducted under RSA 41:31-c shall, upon completion, be made available to the public in accordance with RSA 21-J:19.

II. Unless otherwise required by law, within 10 days of the acceptance by the governing body of any completed audit, a complete copy of the audit and any accompanying management letter shall be submitted to the commissioner by the governing body. If the governing body has not accepted the audit and any applicable adjustments within 45 days of its receipt, the audit as received or adjusted and any accompanying management letter shall be submitted to the commissioner by the governing body with an explanation for non-acceptance. The governing body may, for good cause, petition the commissioner for an extension of time for submittal.

RSA 80:76, II-a. In addition to the circumstances described in paragraph II, the governing body of the municipality may refuse to accept a tax deed on behalf of the municipality, and may so notify the collector, whenever in its judgment acceptance and ownership of the real estate would subject the municipality to undesirable obligations or liability risks, including obligations under real estate covenants or obligations to tenants, or for any other reason would be contrary to the public interest. Reading of Annual Warrant and Election Results.

73 town citizens cast votes out of approximately 615.

Caroll Lothrop and Timothy Peloquin were voted in for 3-year terms as School Board Members.

Elizabeth Leinau was voted in for a 3-year term as District Clerk.

Rebecca Russo was voted in for a 3-year term as District Treasurer

Article 1: Report of District Officers

To hear the reports of the District Officers.

(Included in the Town Report distributed to the town.)

John Berglund, motion.

Larry Levesque, second.

No discussion, accepted unanimously.

Article 2: Main Operating Budget

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,612,073 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the Statutory Obligations of the District for the 2020-2021 Fiscal Year.

John Berglund, motion.

Wayne Brown, second.

Tim Peloquin gave a brief presentation on the history of the school district and its budget.

Jennifer Shepherdson asked if the tax increase will be 30% again. Caroll Lothrop said yes. Shepherdson notes that this is not sustainable. Tim Peloquin agreed, but explained that our options are limited.

Jay Croteau, Selectman, notes that this is a problem that needs to be solved at the state level. Committees are working to solve this problem. In the meantime, the Selectmen are working to cut costs for the town wherever they can. A solution is at least two years away.

Michael Powers asked about the costs involved in reopening the school. Tim Peloquin described the processes required to reopen the school for the town of Surry and how it is prohibitive.

Wayne Brown noted the graph in the Town Report. He asked if the school district has asked about withholding money raised for the state. Tim Peloquin responded that the school district does not pay the state anything.

Jennifer Shepherdson asked if there was any way we can reduce this budget. Tim Peloquin stated that the tuition rate is what it is and the district must pay its bills.

No further discussion. Nancy Callendar re-read the article. Motion passed.

Article 3: Terms

To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

Beth Leinau asked about the charter school and its enrollment process and if the board would ask Surry Village School to place Surry students at the very top of the list.

Jameson Heinz asked the board to give a yes or no answer to this question. Timothy Peloquin said no and stated that the board was hesitant to assert itself beyond its current involvement.

Caroll Lothrop said she works with Director Matora Fiorey every year to determine what children are going to SVC and do not need to be included in the School District Budget. The SVC policy is siblings are first priority then Surry children second. The issue is that for grades one and above, there has to be an opening. In Kindergarten, every year, every Surry child who has wanted to go, got in.

Tim Small said that teacher's children get priority over siblings.

7:32 - Nancy Callendar asked for a motion to adjourn the School District Meeting in order to open the Town Meeting, then adjourn the Town Meeting in order to finish the School Board Meeting.

7:34, Motion to reopen the School District Meeting, Bruce Smith. Second, Tim Small.

Tim Small believes that policies have changed and Surry students are now at the bottom of the list. Timothy Peloquin disagrees.

Rebecca Russo noted that there are a variety of schooling options for Surry students beyond tuitioning to Keene, including VLACS.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$489,148 for general municipal operations. This total does not include appropriations proposed in other warrant articles addressed individually. The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation and the Selectmen tied in recommending this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Moved: B. Smith
Second: J. Brooks
Discussion: L. Levesque - Why was there a tie?

J. Croteau – J. Hines and I disagreed on the amount of money to be raised for road improvement. We need to raise \$100,000 for the road projects, I wanted to raise less than that, Jamison wanted to raise more than that. We were planning on doing the lower part of Joslyn road, we had estimates of \$105,000.00 to rebuild that road, my thought was that might raise our taxes another 30%. I was hoping to do that road in phases and raise only \$25,000. The \$25,000 is reflected in this budget, not the \$100,000.

J. Hines – Don't want to make Joslyn road a two year project. The Old Walpole road is going to take 3 years to pave, which in turn would delay completing other roads. The \$82,000 equates to 1 tax dollar to be paid on every thousand. We'll never get ahead if we keep delaying work projects for the town for years that need to be completed, we're never going to get caught up.

K. Fisher – So the proposal is just to raise the difference between the \$20,000 and the \$82,000?

J. Croteau – I'm trying to cut this budget as lean as possible and hope that the state will finally step up to the plate and contribute one way or the other, so the tax rate doesn't do another 40% jump again. After this year, we'll probably be the top 15 – 20 in the state for tax rates. I'd like to keep people in their homes, a lot of people had problems paying this last tax payment.

J. Hines – Just to clarify – it's the \$25,000, that why we disagreed and that's what you guys are going to vote on.

S. Farrell – So, if we went with your budget, we'd have to increase the budget by another If we went over the budget could we get a broad overview?

C. Berglund – As tax collector, I can tell you there are a lot of elderly people that are hurting for money and having a hard time coming up with the tax increase.

J. Croteau – We didn't get the grant for the lower Pond road, the cemetery budget was cut this year. I picked on everyone equally.

D. Lane – I know some you don't think that \$1.00 per thousand amounts too much, but for our elderly that equates to 6 months worth of groceries for their table. We're

going to have a big jump next year as it is. We didn't like it when it went up 30% this year. People on fixed incomes don't have any discretionary money. My point is – I agree with the general budget as proposed.

Article: Passed.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to place into the existing Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of highway equipment. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Moved: J. Brooks

Second: J. Davis

Discussion: D. Lane – The purpose of my comment here is to propose a motion before we vote on this article. The ability to vote our conscious on all public affairs is a bedrock of our free society. There are citizens in Surry that are uncomfortable with a voice vote or a hand vote. They've been our friends for 40 to 50 years, so what they do is they come and either abstain or just stay home, they don't come to the meeting. Should this assembly adopt the motion that I'm going propose will signify that this body respects the individual rights of the citizens of Surry to freely vote as conscious dictates. Should the assembly choose not to adopt this motion you will express a disinterest in extending individual freedom to cast a vote according to ones' conscious. The motion that I want to propose is this – The vote for article 5 however it may be amended during discussion and any subsequent motions, shall be paper ballot.

Moderator – If a petition is present to me in writing and we have 5 signatures of registered voters then there is a valid vote on that article.

D. Lane collected 5 signatures, verified by the supervisors of the checklist to be registered voters for Surry.

Moderator – This isn't a global type of thing. This had to be proposed for each article. If there is an article on that you want voted on by ballot you must petition each time. This petition is not a vote. There will be a paper ballot for this article.

J. Croteau – Road work is one of the perks of the selectmen's job. But keeping with my theme of cutting the budget were I can, I would like to amend this article to 0 dollars, taking a year off and put this to bed for a year.

Second – E. Eichner

Discussion: Unk person - Can you pull or table the article?

J. Brooks – I oppose that probably because I don't agree with it and secondly because basically you're trying to force a no on the original article. By voting you're trying to raise zero dollars or zero dollars. Why are we even trying to amend this instead of voting the article down.

F. Buffum – Situation preparedness wise, where are we at?

J. Croteau – We have \$52,484.31 in that account.

F. Buffum – We just got the new truck that we paid for a year ago.

J. Croteau – A new loader will probably be next. So a year goes by quick, we're trying to get through another year with that loader. I'm betting that we do.

D. Brooks – Just so people know the condition of the loader it has been up at the repair shop for three and half months. Our loader is on it's last legs. If you had to rent my loader, it's \$3500 a month. Mike's loader is probably \$5000 a month.

J. Croteau – Are you saying our loader is not coming back from the shop?

D. Brooks – It's going to come back, just don't know how well it will work.

M. Powers – What, besides the loader purchase, is the next large purchase?

J. Croteau – I think that's the only thing that I know of, an additional loader.

C. Lothrop – I just want to understand what the obligation to provide support to the people that are struggling to pay their taxes. Is there anything to help reduce or forgive the amount that they are paying.

J. Croteau – I've see that a lot over the last few months, all year actually, for abatements, tax card requests, increase in military and elderly exception applications.

M. Garland – We know that a lot of the expenses are fixed and that we're going to have the same population or growing population, so if we don't put the 20K in the bank this year, do we have to put 40 in next year?

J. Hines – Once we turn these things off, it's harder to turn them back on the next time.

J. Davis – I can see us making major mistakes here. These capital reserve funds are thrifty things. It's like putting money into the bank for those times that you need it. We did have to use the town truck for an extra year, but we ran it way to long in the first place and we had to rebuild the undercarriage in order for it to work.

W. Russell – 2 points – 1. We've heard some generalities about affording taxes. I would like to know out of 600 how many widows do we have and I'd like to know from the tax collector how many are in dire straights.

D. Lane – Caroline and the Selectmen are on the first line of this. People come in and tell their stories. Some people don't even come in to make an official request. This information is very private and I don't believe that Caroline would put out a list of people who haven't made their taxes. You can see in the reports that people are behind in their taxes. So to put a number on it, there are 6 widows on village road.

W. Russell – Are these all widows that can't afford their taxes.

D. Lane – Not all of them. We trying to come off a 30% increase of taxes. We're facing another 30% increase this year. Figure that out from what you paid this year.

That's going to drive people out of town. Where are the elderly going to go?

C. Berglund – I have people giving me payments every month and as long as they do that, it's fine. I cannot deed as long as I get regular payments. I have some that can't make payments. I have to follow the law, I try to be as lenient as possible.

W. Russell - 2nd part – I've been coming here 35 years. If there is one thing the town of Surry does well, it's kicking the can down the road. The chickens have come home to roost. We knew that school enrollment was going up a long time ago and the roads are going to need to be repaired. In past years we loved our low taxes and they were great. We should have made inroads into this and getting ahead when the rate was really low. Now taxes have gone up and everyone has felt it. But I come here and people continue to kick the can down the road.

S. Sweeney – It's your theme for the evening about cutting, are you going after all the articles or just this one?

J. Croteau – Slinging through the fences.

M. Powers – I'm on the budget committee and I'm on board with holding off on Joslyn road. Are we looking at it going to go up to \$100,000 next year with inflation on top of everything else.

J. Croteau – I don't know. Fuel cost directly relate to paving costs. Next year paving could be half price.

C. Englehardt – I'm looking at a \$7000 hospital bill. That's my taxes. Am I going to choose the hospital and my husband coming home or the taxes? Having my husband come home to me is more important that paying the taxes. We all have to make decisions. I like this town and I'd like to stay here.

L. Levesque – We don't have much of a say about the money for the school. If we cut everything to zero, how much per thousand are we going to save?

J. Croteau – I'm trying to cut \$2 off the tax rate, but I don't think I can get there.

Amendment: Defeated.

Article: Passed.

6. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the 250th Anniversary Expendable Trust Fund created in 2014 to pay for the celebration held in 2019. Said funds, \$6.00 with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this article. (Majority vote required).

Moved: F. Buffum

Second: B. Smith

Discussion: C. Lothrop - What a phenomenal 250th celebration we had.

Article: Passed.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to place into the existing Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a future fire truck. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Moved: J. Brooks

Second: M. Powers

Discussion: J. Brooks – This capital reserve fund is for all our fire apparatus. We currently have four vehicles. Our newest vehicle is a 2007, priced new it was \$208,000. Fire equipment goes up 4% every single year. The rate of the appreciation has over stepped what we were putting away. We were putting \$20,000 a year, the price appreciated \$21,000. Our oldest truck is a 1978, our main pumper is the next due for replacement.

E. Anderson - Are the reserve funds invested and is the interest and the income invested in the reserve funds.

S. Sweeney – The interest in not huge. We are restricted were we can invest the funds. They are currently in a New Hampshire municipal pool and this year the interest rate is close to 2%, a lot more than we were getting in the past. Our hands are tied quite a bit, we can't put them in a risky fund. The money does compound, it's not great but that's all we can do.

T. Small – Is there any way to trim it a little bit?

J. Brooks – We are going to need all the money to maintain the service. Personally I don't think there's enough money in the fund. We're looking at other alternatives instead of buying new every single time.

J. Croteau – Move to vote against this article, take a year off, get back to funding it next year.

J. Davis – Little strange all these articles are recommended by the selectmen and now they're saying vote against it.

J. Croteau – When it was originally brought up it sounded good and then with the school budget and the tax increase we need to vote no on something.

M. Kuiawa – Have the selectmen looked at using Keene instead of having our own fire department? What is the cost difference?

J. Croteau – Keene is very much involved. We use them for ambulance service and Keene is on almost every fire call.

J. Brooks – Surry is part of a mutual aid agreement. When Keene has a large fire, all the areas and towns come together to help out. We pool our resources. That being said, it's a mutual aid agreement. When we have a fire, they send us a truck, when they need help, we go. If we don't have a fire department then there is no reciprocity, then there is no mutual aid. Keene is taxed as it is as far as their fire department goes. Their primary goal is to protect Keene. If we relied on Keene, we would have to pay for it. They would need to add another person (full time) for every shift (4 of them) and Surry would have to fit the bill (over \$400,000.)

R. Fiorey – Can we have some type of financial plan for the fire department?

M. Garland – Can you briefly talk about all the services that you provide.

J. Brooks – Fire is the smallest portion of what we do. We do aid response. Our newest engine, is our primary. It's the first vehicle goes to all the calls. The second oldest is a back up so that we have coverage in town in case the primary has to go out on a call, it's also our water supply truck. It was down for 2 months this fall, it 30 plus years old. A lot of parts are rotting away off that vehicle. We had a \$6800 expense at the end of last year that had to come out of this years' budget to cover that.

J. Contrady – Been providing services to the fire department for the last 10 years. We spend a lot of time chasing funds and grants from other sources to help meet our budget. We get turned down a lot because we don't have the space. For the age of the equipment we are considered a high priority town. We are looking for alternate sources for funding from the federal government and private companies. We know what it does to the town when we ask for money, but we are asking everyone we can for help.

D. Lane – I had a fair amount of feedback for the ballot vote for article 5, so I have a petition for this article and any amendments to do a paper ballot for article 7.

S. Farrell – Do we have to go through the checklist again – David are you sure you want that? If this is going to be the norm – have the people checked by the supervisor of the checklist before the meeting begins.

Moderator – We can do that for future meetings.

Article: Passed

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,000 for the purchase of fire equipment, with \$14,000 from the existing Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and

\$7,000 from taxation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Moved: J. Davis

Second: M. Powers

Discussion: J. Brooks – We have to replace our SCBA, (Self-contained breathing apparatus) – so we can bring our air into the area that we need to, house fires, carbon monoxide effected spaces, any place that you need to bring your own air to. It's a necessary piece of equipment. We need to replace the fiberglass wrapped bottles. They have a 15 year life span and that life span is up this year. We have 20 bottles that we need to replace.

Article: Passed.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to place into the existing Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund to pay for a future town wide property revaluation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Moved: J. Davis

Second: L. Levesque

Discussion: S. Goldsmith - Spoke to the selectmen earlier that we are having a lot of issues with Avitar, being professional. Telling residents that they can go into their homes, they cannot. Couple of properties that they picked they've gone to eight times in one year. The selectmen need to make guidelines that Avitar needs to follow.

J. Davis – Looks like a good place to save \$5000.

J. Croteau – State law requires that we have to reassess every five years, but if you vote this down we'll see what happens.

E. Anderson – Came home and found a note that says someone has been here to evaluate my property but nothing was noted on the form that was supposed to be filled out. Very unprofessional.

J. Croteau – Possible that one of their employees is not an a+ rating.

C. Berglund – I received a letter in the mail telling me to make an appointment. I did, they came, they were very professional, I had no problems with the person that came. If you refuse to let them in, they will guess as to what they think the home is worth. You're much better off if you let them in.

W. Brown – What would the state say if we didn't let it happen?

J. Croteau – Not sure of what the state would say.

Article: Defeated

10. To see if the town will vote to clarify Article 11 approved on March 12, 2015. As per provisions of RSA 31:19-a, upon the sale of Cemetery Lots, 75% of the sale of lot money (sale of earth money) be deposited with the Trustees of the Trust Funds into a Cemetery Care expendable trust for maintenance of cemeteries and 25% of funds received shall be deposited in the general fund.

The Cemetery Care expendable trust shall be used at the request of the Cemetery Trustees and approved by the Selectmen.

And further vote that the Cemetery Care expendable trust include all funds received from sale of lots since 2007.

Moved: S. Sweeney

Second: S. Farrell

Discussion: J. Brooks – Can we have a quick idea of what this is.

J. Croteau – When a cemetery plot is sold, the money is put into a trust fund so interest can be used for maintenance of the cemetery. Right now a separate account is used for each plot sold. We want to put all the funds into one fund so we can make more interest and it will be easier to keep track of.

E. Anderson – Does this affect private trusts?

J. Croteau – This is for someone that does not create their own funds.

S. Sweeney – \$225 is taken from the sale of that lot and put into a fund for care of the lot. If we can only use the interest on \$225 a year, we don't get enough. If we can put all the money into one fund we'll make more money on interest. This is not a true trust, the money from the sale of lots needs to go into one fund.

Article: Passed.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

D. Lane – I just want to say that we voted Wally Reney by write in. He's been the town auditor forever probably for 37 years. He doesn't want to die in office, I just want to recognize Wallace Reney, he's been doing this gratis and we want to thank him.

C. Lothrop – Recognize the selectmen. It's a very complex job. Thank you for putting your nose to the grindstone and getting this done for us.

L. Ylitalo - Our road is not passable. Just want to make sure that everyone knows that I've been told that road is going to be better maintained.

J. Croteau – Got a letter from the Surry Fire Department that they are making good progress on the fund raiser. Just want to clarify that all the tax payers have contributed, not just 88. There were \$200,000 other dollars that were contributed by the taxpayers.

B. Smith – Move to close the meeting.

W. Brown – Second.
